Clarendon Historic Hall & Museum

In January the Clarendon Museum was lucky enough to receive the generous donation of a dog registration tag dating back to 1897. The tag was found by Mr Eric Suponin and his son Nicky, whilst relic hunting in the Clarendon Bicentennial Park (reserve opposite the Bakery). The registration tag is in fantastic condition for being over 120 years old. Eric and Nicky had a good browse of our collection after presenting us with the tag. They noticed a brass tag in our War collection had similar characteristics to the tag they had just found. We removed the medal, and lo and behold it was a dog registration tag from 1932. In one day our dog registration tag collection went from one to three!



We encourage everyone to visit the Museum to inspect our expanded dog tag collection! We are opened on the last Sunday of the month between February and November, 1pm to 4pm.

All the children attended the Clarendon Primary School and played local sport. The family were involved in the Tennis club and the Netball club for many years. Craig was an active member of the Clarendon Community Association committee in the early 1990's and was also a member of the CFS.

Now grandparents, Megan and Craig have purchased a caravan and intend to go on extended trips around Australia from their new easy care base in Glengowrie.

Megan spoke highly of Clarendon and the supportive community. She said it was a great place to bring up kids and they have enjoyed their time here immensely.


