## It's a 'figgy' time of the year!



We are so fortunate to live in an area where figs grow in abundance. Such a delicious, versatile fruit. Rich in minerals, antioxidants and soluble fibre.

### Four ways with figs:

1. Fresh, straight off the tree... if you get in before the birds
2. Slice into four, dry in a dehydrator to desired consistency. Ours is usually overnight. Then dip them in chocolate (we use 70-90% Lindt). A great Easter gift - if they last that long.
3. In a salad... they go great in a salad of mixed greens, prosciutto, goat's cheese/mozzarella or blue cheese, walnuts and dressed with olive oil and balsamic vinegar.
4. With breakfast - my favourite way

Figs

2-3 tablespoons of full fat yoghurt (dairy or non-dairy)

2 tablespoons of pecans

1 tablespoon each of pepitas, sunflower seeds and hemp seeds

## Riverbend Park News ... thank you to Dave Clark



Riverbend Park is looking very green with Council watering plus the rains of several weeks ago. The Onkaparinga River is now a series of pools since SA Water stopped releasing water below the weir. On Monday March 1<sup>st</sup> during the afternoon a friend Peter Day, an enthusiastic bird watcher and I spend a hour walking along the river looking for birds. Bird activity seemed pretty quiet compared with the usual early morning activity I see on my early morning walks. However, we saw the following. Nankeen Night Heron, Dusky Moorhen, Wood Duck, Australian Reed Warbler, New Holland Honeyeater, Red Brown Firetail, Adelaide Rosella, Australian Magpie, Red Wattlebird, Superb Fairy Wren. Peter tells me Spring is a good time for a bird count. There are many more birds in and around Riverbend Park and I will continue to record them.

## New playground at Recreation Park

The new playground equipment has been installed near the pavilion at the recreation ground. We are waiting on final landscaping and planting to finish this job off. Thank you once again to the Onkaparinga Council and Andy Smith in particular for sourcing the funding for this upgrade. Still to be completed jobs at the recreation ground include replanting along the oval pathway and landscaping the front of the pavilion. We look forward to seeing our beautiful park looking its best once more in the near future.



The Clarendon Branch of the Agricultural Bureau met on Thursday 18/02/21 at the Clarendon Community Hall. Our guest speaker was the Clarendon Country Fire Service Captain Sue Leslie.

In preparation for the night the members provided a range of questions for Sue to respond to; covering the Cherry Gardens fire, fire truck access to properties, how to let the CFS know that the property has been vacated due to approaching fire, impact of fire retardants on property soil, where the CFS water bombers are stored and how do they prepare for a high bushfire alert day etc.

The Clarendon Branch of the Agricultural Bureau members appreciated Sue giving up her time to address the group.

## Bushfire Safety

The recent Bushfire that came so close to Clarendon have caused all of us to take a moment to reevaluate our plans to either stay and defend or to evacuate.

The Clarendon Community Association (and many other local groups) are taking the time to share more information, to ask questions and to plan for what happens next time.

The CCA have found information on the CFS website that we think is worth sharing with you all. We also hope to share more with the community at the next General Meeting on Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> March 2021 and encourage you to attend.

### What we have learned so far:

- Jackie Houghton is the CFS Community Engagement Officer. They have been running following up meetings with the Kangarilla community however they are also organising other workshops that may interest us. We will let everyone know when and where these workshops will be.
- We asked why the siren was not used during the recent bushfires and were given this information. Current practice is that the siren is only sounded when there is an emergency in Clarendon. They do not want to unnecessarily upset people or alternatively have people becoming complacent if the siren is used too often for any incident or accident in the Clarendon neighbourhood.
- Our closest last refuge places are the Kangarilla Oval and Weymouth Oval at Coromandel Valley. Safer options however are anywhere in the suburbs.
- Horses can be relocated to the Mt Barker showgrounds or Strathalbyn racecourse during an emergency. Owners must stay with them.
- It is not known where a safe space is for other animals however this is being followed up.

## On a fire risk day

### What do I do on fire risk days...

- If your plan is to leave early – leave
- Watch the local conditions – stay up to date with where fires are located
- Move horses and livestock to a safe area
- Keep pets in a safe place ready to move
- Pack personal items and put in car
- Remove anything that will burn easily from around the house
- Add final items to emergency kit
- Pack the car – remember important items such as wallet, cards, keys, papers, etc.
- Put car in driveway or on the side of road ready to go
- Turn off the gas
- Block the downpipes and partially fill gutters if you have time
- Make sure everyone is wearing or has protective clothing – natural material such as pure wool, heavy cotton drill or denim and strong leather boots
- Tell people you are leaving
- Close and lock all doors and windows
- Leave front gate or access gate open

### Leave early – don't wait

Leaving late means you will be on the road when conditions are at their most dangerous or you may not be able to get out at all.
