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What matters to our City

The City of Onkaparinga has a vision of strong, vibrant communities for the 174,000 residents who live, work and play here.

We are committed to bringing that vision to life, but we can't do it alone. Successful outcomes for our communities depend on successful relationships with state and federal governments, and the many service providers, associations and community groups we work with.

As the tier of government closest to the community, we understand deeply what matters locally. We hear about the challenges and opportunities facing residents now, and their concerns for the future. Some of these council can act on ourselves, but many are outside our legislative control. That's why working with our state and federal counterparts is essential to helping our communities thrive.

The aim of this plan is to clearly outline the priority projects and policy issues we've identified across both federal and state electorates in our City. These priorities need federal and state government support if they're to be delivered to the communities who need them.

To us, successful advocacy has many benefits, including:

- funding to deliver priority projects
- improved government policy which drives positive change
- raising awareness of what's most important to our region
- stronger relationships with our political stakeholders

These things help us to create a place where strong, vibrant communities can benefit from the real difference that collaboration makes.

As a principle, we seek 100 per cent funding for projects through advocacy. If we secure partial funding, this opportunity would be considered on a case-by-case basis by Council with regard to impacts on the Long-Term Financial Plan.

How we plan for the future

Our Community Plan 2030 sets the long-term vision, key results and outcomes for the community over the next ten years. It is informed by many important state and federal policies and plans. Our Long-Term Financial Plan and Strategic Asset Management Plan guide our investments to bring the Community Plan to life. With direction from our strategic action plans, organisational priorities and legislated requirements, our Annual Business Plan and Budget sets out our actions for each financial year.

The Community Plan 2030 reflects the key issues and aspirations of our communities, as shared with us through the many community engagements we hold each year. Our 2019 Community Survey of more than 1,000 residents showed the top three priorities for our City are:

1. A sustainable environment
2. A connected, friendly and supportive community
3. Clean and well-maintained natural environment and streetscapes.

The areas of change most residents want action on are:

1. Better residential development and planning practice
2. Improved open space maintenance, accessibility and usability
3. More protection and maintenance of our natural environment

Why advocate now?

Elections for all three spheres of government will happen before the end of 2022.

- Federal election - between August 2021 and May 2022.
- South Australian election - 19 March 2022.
- Local government election - November 2022.

Because the federal and state elections may run in the same year, this plan covers priorities that are relevant to both.

We are always on the lookout for ways to align with the priorities and actions of other governments to deliver greater benefits to our community. There are many federal and state strategies and policies important to our region – the selection below is particularly relevant as it relates to issues our community care deeply about. State electorates

Onkaparinga contains the whole or part of seven state seats, as per the table below.


Black no longer crosses into the City, and the seats of Waite and Heysen have a reduced footprint in the area.

Labor holds four seats and Liberals three. The Liberal seats are concentrated in the north and east of the City, and Labor seats are concentrated in the coastal and southern metropolitan area.

According to definitions used by the Australian Electoral Commission, Mawson and Hurtle Vale are the City's only seats considered 'marginal'. History suggests political parties are more likely to make promises in marginal seats as these are where their commitments are most likely to influence the votes that affect the number of seats held in the House of Assembly.

Note: The Australian Electoral Commission describes a swing-to-lose of 6 per cent or less as 'marginal'. Swing-to-lose figures between 6 and 10% are referred to as 'fairly safe' and anything more than 10 per cent is considered 'safe'.



Our advocacy priorities

Our advocacy priorities list outlines council’s priority projects, which were selected using the following principles:

- limit the number of projects to ensure targeted advocacy
- target projects by electorate to ensure that candidates in all electorates have an opportunity to endorse at least one council project that equitably supports communities across the entire region.
- select policies that align to political parties’ or candidates’ known policies.
- focus on projects that have demonstrable community support.

The list includes key information about the project, which electorates (federal, state and

ward) the project is relevant to, and the number of people potentially affected by or benefiting from the project.

Supplementary projects are also included, shown by state and federal electorates. These provide a broader selection of initiatives (in scale and location) for candidates to consider.

The priority list also includes policy positions we will advocate as opportunities arise during the election period. These are matters outside of council’s responsibility which impact our residents, where we seek a change in state or federal policy or legislation.

These projects and policy priorities will be the basis for tailored advocacy to candidates from

each electorate. Project detail will be prepared and presented for supplementary projects if prospective candidates express interest in them. By sharing the key information relevant to the electorate and highlighting the positive benefits for communities, we can be confident all candidates in our City are aware of the opportunities for delivering outcomes.
