We thank the CFS for their support during the ceremony and also the SA Police who managed the traffic during the formal part of the event.











They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, or the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.


A bridge set to blow!

The Clarendon Bridge (concrete version) celebrates 100th birthday this July. The bridge was and still is a vital infrastructural link between Adelaide and the Fleureau Peninsula. Never was this more evident than during the Second World War. Being one of the only crossings of the Onkaparinga River for many miles around, the Clarendon Bridge was a great strategical asset to any invading forces advancing from the south. To impede these possible threats, sentry posts were placed on either sides of the bridge. Explosive charges were also set into the abutments in preparation to 'blow the bridge' in the event of an invasion of enemy forces from the south. The holes that were drilled for the explosives can still be seen today. There are many more fascinating stories that have occurred at the Clarendon Bridge over the years, both in times of conflict and peace.

Clarendon needs a bridge 1855!

In 1855, Clarendon's school master Mr Cowell, supported by Dr Montgomery, complained that there was no convenience to cross the Onkaparinga River at Clarendon. They suggested building a bridge and pointed out that to date carriers going to Bull Creek had to detour via Echunga or Noarlunga, meaning an extra 17 extra miles. Following this the Central Road Board in 1856 decided that the eastern branch of South Road should leave that road near Wards Corner and go through Happy Valley to Clarendon, and intimated a bridge should be constructed over the river there.

Fortnightly green waste collection but at what cost?

You may have heard some talk about a proposed fortnightly green bin collection for Onkaparinga, rather than the current monthly collection. There is a strong push for the second collection by some Onkaparinga residents, however, it will come at a cost to all of us, likely through a rate increase.

An alternative user-pay system has been suggested where those residents who require a second monthly collection simply buy a second bin.

If you have an opinion about it, it is important that you contact our ward councillors to let them know; they can only go into bat for us based on the communication they receive.

At the CCA meeting last night, the general feeling was that the user-pay system made more sense.

Marion indicated that the only communication she had received was for those in favour of the second collection.

It doesn't require a tome, but a simple statement indicating your preference.

COMMUNITY GENERATOR PROJECT TARGET \$5000

The committee and community groups had identified how at risk we as a community are without a power supply in the event of a fire, storm etc in our region. We are very happy to announce after much work and tenacity by a core group, that we have been successful in gaining a grant towards the cost of a Generator!

This is a substantial project, with the completed project costing just under \$40,000. The Kangarilla CFS has contributed funds from fundraising events held for this purpose. Community members have donated specialist skills, and equipment to assist with costs. We are now seeking further support from the wider community to raise the remaining \$5,000 required to complete the project. This generator will be located at the recreation grounds and will provide an independent reliable power supply when required. Not only the CFS to operate, but it will also supply power to the football clubrooms, toilets, showers, kitchen. With some cable upgrading the Community Hall will also be able to utilise the generator. The planned completion date is June 30th, of this year.

This is an exciting project and a great asset for both our and neighbouring communities. If you can donate towards this project it would be greatly appreciated. Every dollar counts and we believe raising the \$5000 is a very achievable goal.
