Term 2 has been a busy team at Clarendon Primary School, with a key feature being two school camps.

Our Year 2/3 class slept the night at Monarto Zoo and our Year 6/7 class had a two-night experience at Mylor Adventure Camp.

For some it is their first night away from parents and provides a chance to develop responsibility, independence and resilience. On camp our students make their own breakfast, tidy their living spaces and take responsibility for their own belongings.

The Year 6/7 campers were faced with team-building and problem-solving challenges which tested their persistence and team-work.

The challenges included a low-ropes course, raft-making, archery, bridge-building and the 200m long flying-fox! Each camp provides quality time for relationship building between students and the students and staff.

As is often the case with Clarendon Primary School, the feedback from the camp regarding the behaviour and attitude of our students was outstanding.

## Our apple harvest this year!



What to do with all these apples – gave them away, made apple pies, apple muffins, stewed apples for breakfast, lunch and dinner (!!), froze them .... apple cider did not quite happen but planned for the 2020 harvest!!

Here's an apple slice recipe you might like to try.

## Danielle Diener's Apple Slice

1 packet butter cake mix
1 cup coconut
125g melted butter
Mix together in food processor and
dry bake in slice tin at 180c for 15
minutes

#### Topping

1 carton sour cream 3 dessert spoons sugar

1 egg

Beat together by hand

400gm cooked apple or about 2 cups (Try other cooked or tinned fruit as well)

Place apples on top of baked base and pour over topping. Sprinkle with cinnamon and bake for 30 minutes at 180c

### Clarendon Branch of the Agricultural Bureau

June 2019

The Clarendon Branch of the Aaricultural Bureau welcomed speaker, David Trueman who provided insight into the Clarendon Water Tunnel. David previously worked for SA Water and had some background knowledge of the Clarendon Water Tunnel. David explained the way the tunnel was excavated with shafts being dug to the required level. Workmen then dug to join the next shaft and eventually the tunnel was linked up and ready to receive water from the Clarendon Weir into the Happy Valley Reservoir. David explained that the original water tunnel was enlarged in the 1960s with the help of workers from the completed Snowy Mountain Scheme. The area now known as Peace Park was the site for worker accommodation and machinery and was later converted into a YMCA camp. When the water tunnel was enlarged it was concrete lined at the beginning and at the exit to reduce erosion. The water tunnel is surveyed annually by SA Water Engineers who drive vehicles through the tunnel to ensure the water tunnel is working properly.

The Advertiser Friday 31<sup>st</sup> July 1896 Happy Valley Water Works

The opening ceremony in connection with the Happy Valley Waterworks will be performed by his Excellency the Governor on August 8 (1896). The arrangements which are being made by the Commissioner of Public works are nearly complete. Invitations have been issued, to the number of about 250, to the judges, the members of both Houses of the Legislature and their wives, the mayors of all corporations, and the chairmen of all district councils and their wives in the Adelaide water area, the officers in connection with the Public Works department who have been directly interested with the construction of the works, and representatives of the press. The invitations are absolutely limited to those and no exception whatever will be made. The party will leave by the 10.20 a.m. and on arrival at the Blackwood Station will be met by traps, which will convey them to Clarendon. Here an address of welcome will be presented to his Excellency the Governor by the chairman of the local district council (Mr. Gibbins). The next move will be to the weir, Where Sir Fowell Buxton will perform the ceremony of opening the valve to allow the water to flow into the inlet tunnel. Light luncheon will be provided on the recreation ground and a few speeches will be made. They will, however, be limited, so that ample time may be allowed in order to proceed to the reservoir so that the water as it flows in may be seen. The party will then be driven to the city.



### **Clarendon Community Association Briefs**

The CCA remains active in advocacy with main engagements:

- Our efforts to support the court users in their ongoing negotiations with council regards lighting, safety and emergency access has been successful with all parties now working together and a cornerstone commitment to retention of courts at southern end of oval
- We (under Des Fowles stewardship) continue to seek clarification, pursue a resolution and monitor the town planning / zoning matter- this is expected to be clearer by end of 2019.
- The efforts toward a master plan for River Bend park precinct continues and this matter is now formally before council and their Strategic Directions Committee for the July 2019 meeting
- By better understanding, patience and engagement, improve the relationship with City Of Onkaparinga
- The CCA and the executive remain committed to improving the communication between all Clarendon stakeholders and we welcome feedback so please let one of us know how we may do better

The dedicated hall committee continues to make progress toward better outcomes at the Hall by establishing best practice outcomes for all parties and are also working hard with the Education department in regards to the new lease for the Kindergarten.

The Anzac Day commemoration was a success and the special purpose sub-committee have seamlessly moved to the 100 year bridge celebration; the efforts of many ensure these events are successful however the leadership efforts of Mr Gavin Fisher and Mr Brad Pickford are appreciated.

The refreshed Clarendon welcome booklet is set for release and thanks to all those involved, in particular to Helen, for taking this on and getting it done.

## Do you have an escape plan for your family should your house catch fire?

Ensure all family members know at least 2 escape routes both in the day and especially at night.

## **Burning in the Open**



Remember burning in the open is recommended from 12 midday until 12 midnight.

Please be sure to check the council website or contact them personally to ensure you know which zone you are in and if you are able to burn without a permit.

If you do fall into this category – please be sure to follow the burning requirements as some aspects of the ground are very dry despite the cool and wet weather.
