## How do you plan for something when you don't know what you're planning for?

Around this time of year my focus as brigade captain is to ensure the brigade is ready for the upcoming fire season. This includes preparing ourselves and our equipment.

But what about you – are you really ready? Ask yourself what I would do if:

- the fire pump doesn't work on the day
- the heat is so intense that it destroys hoses and pipes
- the roads are blocked due to fallen trees that prevents your escape
- the electricity is turned off and there is no phone

**PLEASE** consider the physical (are you fit enough?) and the psychological impact (do you really know how loud it will be or how dark it will be?)

### Burning in the Open

Remember burning in the open is recommended from 12 midday until 12 midnight. Please be sure to check the council website or contact them personally to ensure you know which zone you are in and <u>if you are able to burn without a permit</u>. If you do fall into this category please be sure to follow the burning requirements as some aspects of the ground are very dry despite the cool and wet weather. 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# New shed for Clarendon Netball Club - thanks to MP's advocacy

Clarendon Netball Club can now lock up their equipment in a secure shelter thanks to a \$30,000 grant advocated for by the Federal Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie. The Community Development Grants Programme funding will allow the club to build a purpose-built shed and permanent barbecue shelter to cater for the needs of the 150-member club.

"From six teams 15 years ago, Clarendon Netball Club has grown significantly to become the largest club in the Southern Hills Netball Association with 20 teams," Rebekha said. "Unfortunately, their facilities haven't kept up with the growth or the times and they approached my office for assistance. "Members have worked hard to maintain their presence in the Clarendon area so I am pleased that this grant will allow them to upgrade their shedding and provide cover for the barbecue area and canteen."

Clarendon Netball Club President Chris Rose welcomed the announcement.

"Having shedding and shelter that is permanent, lockable and waterproof, will be an amazing and much-needed addition to our facilities," Ms Rose said this week.

"We are renowned for being the biggest club with the worst amenities.

"But it is not only the netball club that will benefit. The tennis club will have much-needed shelter during summer, and facilities to put all their equipment away, and any other sporting codes looking at joining the Clarendon Recreation grounds will now have a place to store things.

"This addition will benefit all the Clarendon Community and we are all truly grateful to Rebekha for advocating on our behalf."

### The Clarendon Agricultural Bureau

The Clarendon Branch of the Agricultural Bureau met on Thursday 17/10/19 at the Clarendon Community Hall. The guest speaker was Mark Gardiner -Associate Professor in Biodiversity and Molecular Ecologist from Flinders University/South Australian Museum who provided a presentation on Lizards.

Mike provided background to his study of some specific species of lizards the Gidgee Skink, Sleepy Lizard and Pygmy Blue Tongue. Mike explained that the Pygmy Blue Tongue was last seen at Marion in 1959 and was believed extinct until 1992 when they were discovered living in the mid north of South Australia.

David Attenborough recently did a TV special "Living in Cold Blood" which was filmed in the mid north and included the Pygmy Blue Tongue.

Currently Mike and his team have been working with landholders in the mid north to preserve the Pygmy Blue Tongue and other varieties of Lizards habitat.



### Clarendon Primary School Community Art Mural


Over the last few months local artist, Di Lamont has kindly shared her expertise, resources and time in working with our students to create a beautiful art mural.

The inspiration for the art work came from the school's Student Representative Council who decided they would like a "legacy piece" with handprints of all the students in the school. The SRC discussed how much they would enjoy the Art work now and into the future, as their handprint would become a permanent feature and reminder of their time at our school.

The first challenge was finding someone who could help! Our Governing Council suggested Di, and after meeting with her she kindly agreed to help. ### Fire at the Royal Oak May 14 1880

It was a cold morning in May as it often is in Clarendon when Robert Bullman, the publican lit the fire, in the main fireplace. Having only been a tenant for 6 months he knew one of the jobs before winter set in was to have the chimneys swept. He has inspected them and knew that the main chimney had a great build-up of soot. It was impossible to sweep due to its irregular and winding nature. He had cleaned what he could but knew it needed to be carefully monitored. So when it caught fire it was no surprise and water was quickly brought to douse the flames.

The water had no effect, the heat became intense and the bricks began to glow, they were described as incandescent in appearance. Smoke began to fill the rooms and Robert Bullman made the assumption that more than soot was burning. He acted guickly, called for help from neighbours and started to pull down an inner wall alongside the chimney to discover the floor joists of the upper storey projected into the chimney space and were now well alight. They had been clad in tin but this did very little to protect them. It would have only been a matter of minutes before the floorboards resting on the joists would have ignited and the whole building would have been well alight. By this time men of neighbouring properties were on the roof relaying water, which was no easy task as water was scarce and the roof steep. Others quickly removed furniture as quickly as possible in a very indiscriminate manner. After a hours hard work the fire was finally put out and the building saved.

A telegram was sent to the Insurance Office and a delegate was sent out promptly, Robert Bullman was compensated for his loss and the Insurance Company demanded the chimney be pulled down and rebuilt straight before they would accept any further risk. There had been a build-up of 10 inches of soot in places (around 25cm) and it was deemed an accident waiting to happen. So impressed was the Insurance company at the willingness and competence of those that saved the building they gave Robert Bullman £25 to distribute to those who helped.

Construction of a new chimney was started immediately.

### Online Budget Tool


