### A tough harvest and a circus

In January 1869 Clarendon had undergone harvest and although the weather was fair the harvest was small. A severe heat wave in December had destroyed a lot of the fruits, with apricots and plums scorched on the trees, so they were fed to the pigs. The pea crops were good and the potatoes looked to be growing well - if the frosts kept away. Cash in the town was scarce and businesses were suffering.

The new courthouse was nearly complete, but locals were not happy that the chimneys were being built of plastered brick and not stone as per the specifications. It was seen as a such a waste of public money when stone was so plentiful.


The Weslyan Church was growing and the imminent birth of the pastor Rev. W. F. Worth's child in January was a much looked forward to event. Sadly, the baby girl was still born. The town seemed to be at a sad and low ebb.

The Weslyan Church took charge of the situation and organised a harvest festival, held on the 27th January. An afternoon picnic was held at the river, the spot being described as a very pretty spot by the Onkaparinga River. There were games and activities and the townspeople thoroughly enjoyed themselves and spirits were boosted. There was even a booth where the wants of the 'inner man' were attended to. I wonder what these were. Weslyans were teetotallers so I would have thought it would not be alcohol, maybe just a place to sit with other men and drink ginger beer? The day ended with a large tent being erected and tea served before an enjoyable public meeting was held where thanks was given that there was a harvest.

The church was the centre of the community and certainly took a position of looking after its people. Times were tough and food and money scarce, but spirits were lifted, and a sense of community strengthened by such events.

Another event was organised in early March for the Weslyan Sunday School Anniversary. There was a well-attended tea meeting followed by the arrival of Stebbing's Circus which was erected near the Royal Oak Hotel. The townsfolk gathered and had the opportunity of witnessing the first circus in the neighbourhood. The performance was described as first rate and was the topic of conversation in the town for a long time.

### Something to think about

The cold weather is here and house fires are on the rise! Just a reminder to ensure you have changed your smoke detector battery. Smoke detectors are compulsory in all SA homes, but they are only useful if they are working and now is a good time to replace the battery!

Smoke detectors should be replaced every 10 years!

Do you have deadlocks or security screens on windows and doors? Do you have access to the keys in an emergency? Do you have an escape plan for your family should your house catch fire? Ensure all family members know at least 2 escape routes both in the day and especially at night.
