Anzac Light Memorial & Film – Australian War Nurses

Clarendon Historic Hall & Museum 7pm-9pm Friday 22nd April – Monday 25th April 2022

For Anzac Day this year we are commemorating the heroic contributions nurses have made during times of conflict. This year's Light Memorial has been extended, and will feature poignant insights about our wartime nurses, a tribute to our local nurses who served, plus the memorial to our fallen soldiers of WW1 and WW2., Catch a viewing of our latest documentary 'Chin up girls, Australian War Nurses' at the Light Memorial. This 12-minute documentary explores the amazing work these women did in caring for the wounded. It also features stories of our own local nurses, Sister Lucretia Smart and Sister Nicky Richards. Although the stories of what these women endured can be heartbreaking, it was their ability to remain resolute against the odds, to heal the sick and the wounded, that is truly inspiring.


WE DID IT!

Community Led Emergency Resilience Workshops Now in Clarendon

With a changing climate influencing projections of increased natural disasters, there is an increasing need for communities to become more engaged with existing emergency management through locally appropriate and community-owned actions.

Please join Red Cross' Community-Led Emergency Resilience project through participating in a series of four workshops.

The workshops aim to bring communities together, empowering them to identify and take local actions which are owned by communities themselves. The workshops are for individuals, community groups, local businesses and local government to co-create actions, plans and resources to respond and recover from emergencies.

As part of this project, community participants will have the opportunity to:

- · Meet other community members and organisations and learn more about each other
- · Understand more about emergency management, roles and responsibilities
- · Identify and map strengths and risks in their community
- Increase knowledge of emergency resilience and what steps they can take to increase community emergency resilience
- Learn to use the Torrens Resilience Institute Scorecard as a tool to measure their emergency resilience progress

The Clarendon Branch the Agricultural Bureau March 2022 meeting was hosted by a local landowner at her property on Gosse Road Clarendon.

The landowner bought the property about 9 years ago and strongly believes that she is only the custodian of the property, and she needs to care for it for future generations. On her property she has peacocks, chickens, Damara sheep, and an emu that looks after the sheep.



In addition, she has beehives where she annually harvests honey from the hives. She explained the process of re-Queening a beehive and the intrinsic way the new queen is accepted by the hive.



She also explained that the previous owners had planted 500 trees on the property to create a native corridor as well as wind breaks for the grazing paddocks.


