During February I attended the two community listening posts held by Erin Thompson (State Member for Davenport) at Godfrey Reserve, Darlington and Plantation Avenue Reserve, Flagstaff Hill and one held Amanda Rishworth (Federal Member for Kingston) at Flagstaff Hill Shopping Centre on Saturday 24 February which gave me another opportunity to speak to residents about local matters. On that same afternoon I attended the Vine Street Old Reynella Festival and then in the evening represented Mayor Were at the Community Fun Festival held at the Lutheran College at Aberfoyle Park, again providing further opportunities to speak with residents.

During the month I also attended the Flagstaff Hill Queen's Scout Awards presentations, Onkaparinga Shaping Our City Community Workshop, the Southern District Neighbourhood Watch Committee, Beachside Food and Wine Festival, Happy Valley Oval Board meeting, Neighbourhood Watch State Council meeting, Northern Community Forum, Coromandel Community Centre Board meeting, the Multi-Use Facilities Governance and Operations Review workshop, the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community Peace Symposium gathering (Christie Downs Community House), a Community Simple Steps to Sustainable Water Conservation Information session (Aberfoyle Community Centre), Flagstaff Hill Neighbourhood Watch Zone meeting, Keys to the City civic reception for Helen Oxenham presentation, Aberfoyle Men's Breakfast, the Community Facilities Regional gathering (McLaren Flat), commissioning of the new Clarendon CFS water storage tank at the Hazel McKenzie Hall, Healthy Cities Onkaparinga Collaborative meeting, Friends of Frank Smith Park consultation, along with two elected members workshops and the monthly Council meeting.

I generally find that I have engagements most weekday evenings (often with many clashes) as well as during the day and weekends but still find time to spend with my grandsons, wife, family, and our lovely Dalmatian Tessa who enjoys walking around Flagstaff Hill/Aberfoyle Park daily (often engaging with residents on these walks about council matters). Over recent months I have been approached by residents in Thalassa Ward (and other areas) who have raised concerns regarding the risk that some eucalyptus trees may be creating to the community and as a consequence I have a number of Questions on Notice on this issue that will appear in the Council meeting agenda for Tuesday 19 March, so if you are interested in this issue please read the agenda when it becomes available on-line from Friday 15 March.

Of considerable importance is the Essential Services Commission of South Australia (ESCOSA) reports into 17 councils, (one of which is the City of Onkaparinga) that were released on Friday 29 February as this report will have significant impact on the City of Onkaparinga's future budgets and Long-Term Financial Plan. It is the first time there has been an opportunity for the City of Onkaparinga to have such an independent assessment along with other councils. Unfortunately, the report was not favourable for the City of Onkaparinga and will require some very important decisions to be made by Council in the current budget preparation and community consultation process for the 2024 – 2025 budget. Resident Gill Golding South Australian Citizen of the Year

Council extendends a huge congratulations to Onkaparinga resident Hackham West's Gill Golding, who was recently crowned South Australian Citizen of the Year. Each year the Australia Day Council of South Australia celebrates the achievements and contributions of outstanding members of their communities through the Citizen of the Year Awards.

Gill Golding is an inspiring leader in Hackham West, an area of significant socio-economic disadvantage. Through her advocacy and community engagement, Gill addresses socio-economic challenges with determination and compassion. As chairperson of the Hackham West Community Centre, she oversees 22 programs serving over 10,000 people annually; helping to guide those who need it through tough times. Gill's influence spans councils and organisations like the Hackham West Children's Centre Governing Council and People Matters Hackham West (PMHW), where she fosters unity and equity, inspiring positive community contributions. Gill was awarded the City of Onkaparinga Citizen of the Year on Australia Day and now claims the award for South Australian Citizen of the Year.

Have Your Say - Proposed Changes to Dog Areas

The City of Onkaparinga wants your feedback on proposed changes to dog on-leash and dog-prohibited areas at 15 sites across the city.. The proposed changes (spread across wetlands, reserves, open spaces, and beaches and sand dunes) respond to feedback received from the community in 2022 when the council was remaking its Dog By-law. Many of the changes are aimed at protecting important wildlife and plant species (some of them threatened or endangered) by proposing on-leash restrictions where there are currently none. Other changes, such as at Port Noarlunga beach (where it is proposed dogs will be prohibited at all times during daylight savings, rather than only between 10am and 8pm) aim to increase compliance with existing controls, and to create a space for those scared of dogs to visit the beach with confidence.

Following consultation, a report including the engagement outcomes will be provided to Council, who will consider the proposed changes and decide whether to adopt the change for each site. Unless otherwise signposted, Onkaparinga's parks and reserves are available for the off-leash exercise of dogs (excluding playground areas), as well as almost 10 kilometres of foreshore. There are currently three dog parks in Onkaparinga (Huntfield Heights, Happy Valley and Aldinga) with a fourth to be completed at Woodcroft this year thanks to state government funding and the support of Nat Cook, Member for Hurtle Vale.

Council's Parklet Program

The City of Onkaparinga's Economic Growth and Tourism team have run the successful Parklet Program since 2016, offering hospitality businesses the opportunity to 'host' a parklet to create outdoor dining. The parklets are a built platform that consist of benches/chairs, tables and is typically positioned over one or two car parking spaces to transform them from 'places for cars' to 'places for people'. Each business hosts the parklet for 12 months and it is their responsibility to dress, furnish and maintain the parklet to look inviting to patrons during their term. Parklets are able to go on council roads (where appropriate) but not state roads.

Council's two parklets are on the move in March to Seaside Spit, Beach Road, Christies Beach and Golden Fleece Café, High Street, Willunga.

Previous host businesses include:

- Hither and Yon & de Rose Kitchen, Shifty Lizard Brewing Co. and Redwood Oven in Willunga
- Beach Road Pizza, CJ's Bakery, Delicia Acai & Protein Bar, The ESPY Bakehouse, The Ripple & Swirl Café, The Bubbly Tea and Coffee Co. in Christies Beach
- Beck's Bakehouse and the Coffee Factory in Port Noarlunga

Beck's Bakehouse at Port Noarlunga is a great example of the benefits of the program, which hosted a parklet in 2017 and then expanded to create permanent outdoor dining capacity.

Sustainable Fashion On-Show McLaren Vale

Do you have a flair for fashion and a passion for the planet? It's time to turn your imaginative designs into eco-chic masterpieces for McLaren Vale's inaugural Recycled Runway. Registrations are open now for Recycled Runway McLaren Vale, which challenges local designers and creatives to transform pre-loved clothes into catwalk-ready outfits, which will then be modelled at a fashion show at Wirra Wirra's cellar door on 25 May. The brainchild of the McLaren Vale Business and Tourism Association and She Sews, with support from the City of Onkaparinga (through an Environment and Sustainability Grant), the inaugural event aims to promote sustainability and raise awareness about responsible fashion choices.

Designers keen to participate in the event (either in the student or open round) must have <u>registered</u> by Wednesday 28 February (\$20 for those who live in Onkaparinga, \$40 for those outside the region).

Once registered, you can pick up your design kit containing five op-shop or unwanted garments from Friday 1 March, before getting to work on your sustainable masterpieces.

Models (who can be anyone, such as friends or family of the designers) will then take the outfits to the catwalk at the inaugural event, with prizes and recognition on offer for your innovative designs.

If you are keen to contribute but do not want to design or model outfits, you can donate pre-loved clothes at She Sews at 17 Liddiard Street, McLaren Vale, which will be included in the participants' design kits.

Recycled Runway McLaren Vale organiser Megan Caldersmith said she loves working on community projects because she thinks it is really important to bring people together.

"As a fashion designer and creative I'm appalled at the effect the fashion industry is having on our environment, so it made sense to join my two passions together," she said.

"Recycled Runway illustrates this combination, drawing inspiration from similar successful initiatives like the long-standing Mount Gambier event, which inspiringly has been running for 20 years."

One Tree Per Child Onkaparinga

Council has push to inspire community to plant trees and shrubs on private land across is about to go forward, as it is firming up plans to partner with global tree planting advocates One Tree Per Child (OTPC) on an Onkaparinga based program starting in 2024.

How it will work in 2024

In 2024, council is focusing on helping create habitat for a flagship species of council's <u>Ecological Linkages Study</u>, the Yellow-Tailed Black Cockatoo — plants we promote to will include Silver Banksia (*Banksia marginata*) and Drooping Sheoak (*Allocasuarina verticillata*), easy to grow in even small backyards.

This year OTPC Onkaparinga will feature two components:

- School focus an EOI to all ELC's and schools that are part of the Sustainable Schools program offering the opportunity for 4 lucky schools to work with Green Adelaide Education on tree planting/education, with trees available for a number of students. Dependent on space, the students can either plant at the school or take their tree home to plant.
- Household focus a number of trees/shrubs will be available for families to plant at home they will commit to helping to plant their tree with a young family member (e.g. child, grandchild, nephew, beloved neighbour etc). An interactive tree information session on tips for tree planting and care will occur along with an online video. Hands-on planting events on council land are also being planned and open to all.

Launch of OTPC Onkaparinga Online 22 April, Earth Day

The program will also be promoted to the community via an article in the April print and online copy of Onkaparinga Now, social media posts and targeted through our community and youth centres and libraries. We anticipate a great deal of media interest due to celebrity endorsement.

Family Tree Giveaway Event Sunday 2 June

The Family Tree Giveaway event will be held Sunday 2 June, 2-5pm at Seaford Community Centre, where we'll give out our household trees and have a range of information stalls, talks and fun family activities.

Other tree and greening projects underway in 2023–24, include/d:

- In November, new sustainability rebate categories were launched that include the purchase of native plants and trees for residents' urban gardens.
- In December, a Council report arising from another recent notice of motion, outlined the ways City of Onkaparinga could increase tree plantings.
- In March (tbc), we will release the findings from Green Adelaide's tree canopy mapping to residents, comparing 2018–19 and 2022 across metropolitan Adelaide (including in Onkaparinga).
- In April (tbc), a joint Resilient South and Resilient East campaign called "You Can't Arb That" (a nod to ABC's popular TV show, You Can't Ask That) will be launched, featuring council arborists in a series of humorous videos answering common questions councils receive from the community about trees.

- In May we will launch a 4 week 'Botany Club' for kids at Woodcroft Library that helps them to understand the value of trees and greening.
- In July, to tie in with National Tree Day 2024 we will encourage residents to vote for their Tree of the Year from our first year of Tree of the Month winners, which was launched on National Tree Day 2023.

Witton Bluff Base Trail Update

Work commenced on Friday 1 March on the long-anticipated Witton Bluff Base Trail, that will link two of the state's most iconic beaches. The 1.37km trail will connect the foreshores of Port Noarlunga and Christies Beach, providing the final link for a continuous 11.3km coastal path from O'Sullivan's Beach to Moana. Jointly funded by the state government and the City of Onkaparinga, the new \$6.7 million accessible trail will seal and improve disability access to a popular existing informal path from Christies Beach. It will also extend it via a new elevated three-metre-wide boardwalk above the existing wave-cut shelf around the bluff through to Port Noarlunga. It is

expected to be completed in late 2024, with work on repairing the seawall and constructing the remaining path to commence in late 2024. The completed trail is expected to open in mid-2025.

The Witton Bluff Base Trail will benefit the local economy, help our communities stay healthy and active, attract visitors to the region, reflect and honour the site's important Kaurna heritage through interpretative elements, and help protect the cliffs from coastal erosion. It is part of the state government's Coast Park vision, which aims to develop a 70-kilometre shared-use path from North Haven to Sellicks Beach with matching funding support provided by councils.

City of Onkaparinga's 31-kilometre coastline makes up almost half of this connected trail, and the council has been working closely with the state government since 2003 to deliver it, with more than half (17.8km) of Onkaparinga's 31 kilometres delivered so far.

The Coast Park project aims to improve access, facilities and reserves along the coastline, generating significant community benefit, through recreation and leisure activities, economic opportunities and protection of the natural environment. City of Onkaparinga Draft Coastal Adaptation Plan

Council is seeking your views on the City of Onkaparinga's draft Coastal Adaptation Plan. The plan outlines what the council will do from 2024 to 2030 to anticipate and respond to the impacts of climate change and sea level rise on its 31km coastline.

In particular, the plan focusses on the risks of erosion and flooding, with a greater focus on erosion.

Earlier studies, including the council's 2021 *Coastal Adaptation Study*, find that erosion poses a higher risk than flooding because most of Onkaparinga's coastline is elevated. This means that the main threat to the coast is to public assets because most private assets are set behind public roads.

While the plan will guide approaches to 2030, projections show that most coastal impacts will be realised in the second half of this century. The plan is therefore informed by research, investigations and risk assessments that have considered possible changes up to 2100.

The City of Onkaparinga has already undertaken a range of activities to support coastal adaptation, such as replenishing dunes, managing outlet flows from rivers and creeks, revegetating cliffs, installing sandbag groynes, and building sea walls.

Unlike coastal management – which is about day-to-day management of the coast – the Coastal Adaptation Plan focusses solely on our responses to climate change.

The draft plan proposes four goals:

- Goal 1: Information and evidence
- Goal 2: Resilience
- Goal 3: Community knowledge and action
- Goal 4: Resources and capability

These goals will be achieved through 25 separate actions that are based on evidence and mindful of community expectations.

Some of these actions are planned or are under way and are being funded through our existing operational and capital budget allocations.

Others will require grant funding from the state or Australian governments, while others will be largely met only through staff time.

Grants Gully Road Clarendon – Obscured Children Pedestrian Signage

Following information from a resident regarding the pedestrian/children crossing signage on Grants Gully Road, Clarendon being obscured by tree branches, council staff have been in contact with the Department of Infrastriucture and Transport (DIT).

Grants Gully Road is an arterial road under the care, control and management of the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT). This means that trees covering DIT School Zone signage and crossing movements including crossing related line marking on Grants Gully Road are the responsibility of DIT.

Council have request DIT address the matter and update council.

Dangerous Driving

I have noticed an signficant increase in "wheelie" marks on our roads particuarly along Pine Road, Woodcroft (in the vicinity of the junction with Pimpala Road), Oakridge Road Aberfoyle Park (along the rural section towards Main Road), along Manning Road Aberfoyle Park) towards the the Happy Valley Drive junction, and numerous other roads in Happy Valley, Cherry Gardens and Woodcroft. If you witness such behaviour then please see if you can any video footage and vehcile registration numbers and report it to the South Australia Police. If you have dashcam footage then keep it and povide it to the police. Both my cars have good qualkity front and rear dashcams fitted that captures the images very clearly. This sort of behaviour puts our community to considerable risk and can add to our road fatalities. In the early days of my policing career I had to deliver that unfortunate message to those who had lost a loved one following a fatal vehicle collision, complete the identification process of the deceased and also attend their postmortems. To everyone please drive safely.

Neighbourhood Watch Meetings Schedule
