

This year to date is Adelaide's dryest start since 1923. However, in 2022 April's rain fall was only 18.2mm. In the first 4 months we only recorded 72.2 mm. By the end of that year, we received 815mm - an average annual rainfall.

Something to think about

Even though fire season has ended – don't forget that our weather patterns are such that the bushfire risk is still there. Please make sure you are prepared.

But – as the bushfire risk declines and the weather is cooler – the risk of a house fire increases.

It's time to think about the following:

- Have you changed your smoke detector battery? Smoke detectors are compulsory in all SA homes, but they are only useful if they are working! Now is a good time to check your battery.
- Have you updated your smoke detector? Smoke detectors should be replaced every 10 years.
- Do you have deadlocks or security screens on windows and doors? Do you have access to the keys in an emergency?
- Do you have an escape plan for your family should your house catch fire? Ensure all family members know at least 2 escape routes both in the day and especially at night.
- Are electric blankets in good condition?

Everyone is welcome to come up to the Clarendon CFS every Monday night from 6.30pm. You can join us and that way you could learn valuable skills to protect yourself, your family and your pets and property.




Grow Free Cart

Julianne began her presentation by explaining and showing pictures of the various varieties of Camelids which the Alpaca is part of that breed.

She then went on to explain the differences in fleece between the different varieties of Camelids.

Some Alpaca fleeces are such a high quality that there is a demand for their fleece.



Julianne explained the mating process between Alpacas and the inhouse procedure that shows whether the female is pregnant.

Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget 2024–25

The rate increase explained

The draft Annual Business Plan and Budget 2024–25 is focused on budget repair.

The proposed rate increase is 6.8 per cent, plus rates from new properties (growth).

We will still deliver \$158.29 million in services, programs and asset maintenance, and \$73.57 million in new projects and initiatives for the community.

Why is the rate increase 6.8 per cent?

Council has run at an operating deficit for seven consecutive years, and we need to act now to return to a balanced budget as soon as possible.

Setting the rate at 6.8 per cent, plus a range of other measures detailed in the draft Annual Business Plan and Budget, will return us to a balanced budget. Each year we need to balance the external pressures—such as rising inflation and material and service cost increases—with what the community expects us to deliver.

In addition this year, we need to return to a balanced budget, so hard decisions were made about the rate and other measures, to make sure we achieve this.

The actions we are taking also align with recommendations from the Essential Services Commission of SA regarding our ongoing financial sustainability.

What has council done to find savings?

We have identified a \$2.48 million reduction in employee costs in addition to previously identified savings of \$2.5 million. Through better calculation of depreciation on stormwater assets we have also achieved a \$2 million saving.

As part of our continual review of contracts, materials and other expenses we have delivered a further saving of \$700,000.

The combined total of these items is \$7.68 million in savings.

We are also continually focused on alternative funding and revenue sources to reduce the reliance on rates in the longer term.

Will residents still get the services, maintenance and projects they need?

Yes. We will continue to provide essential services and maintenance across our growing city.

This includes waste services, maintenance of assets including roads, footpaths, parks, libraries and community centres, and a range of important support services for disadvantaged people.

City-wide projects totalling more than \$73.57 million will be delivered including the annual road resealing program, urgent and general roadworks, bushfire preparedness, tree pruning, footpaths, and lighting upgrades and maintenance.

What can I do if I am having difficulty paying my rates?

We recognise that some ratepayers are experiencing ongoing financial hardship and we can assist by providing a range of options to manage payment of rates that are outstanding or will soon become overdue.

In the first instance please contact our Customer Relations team on 8384 0666 to discuss the options that may best suit your circumstance.

To make an application for hardship, contact an accredited financial counsellor to assist you with this process.

To find a local financial counsellor, please phone the National Debt Helpline on 1800 007 007 or visit ndh.org.au/talk-to-a-financial-counsellor.

The financial counsellor will then contact us, either with you or on your behalf, to progress your application. All details supplied are confidential.

Ratepayers who hold a State Seniors Card can apply to postpone payment of rates on their principal place of residence each year. Seniors must pay \$500 of their rates each year but can postpone payment of any amount levied above this.

Postponed rates remain as a charge on the land and are not required to be repaid until the property is sold or disposed of. Monthly interest charges apply to amounts postponed.
