

Clarendon Primary School

It's been a busy month up here at Clarendon Primary School. Book Week was celebrated with the school hosting an Elders' Day where the children invited their grandparents and other relatives into their classroom to participate in some Book Week activities. The students (and three grandparents!) also enjoyed the opportunity to dress up as their favourite book character or come dressed related to the theme of *Dreaming with Eyes Wide Open*; some came in their pyjamas.



Visitors of our Year 3-4 students were lucky enough to join a Kitchen Garden lesson and participate in some cooking (and eating).

During Book Week the students and kindy were also treated to a performance called *Story Quest* by Echelon Productions which included lots of singing and dancing.

The students at CPS have recently enjoyed a visit from the RAA team to learn about Road Safety including, crossing the road using "Stop, Look, Listen, Think", how to be safe passengers in vehicles and the importance of being visible when near a road. One of our parents (a practising doctor) has also held tailored first aid classes for each of our four classes. The children were able to use a stethoscope to listen to a heartbeat, they were taught how to use bandages and splints on each other and shown how to perform CPR on a dummy. Using a UV light they also discovered how difficult it is to wash their hands thoroughly.



Grow Free Cart



Local residents Elisa and Paul Ridings have built a grow free cart and it is now set up at the Clarendon Community Hall.

The Grow Free concept originated in Strathalbyn and now has hundreds of carts world-wide.

The motto is "Give what you can, take what you need". This is a way to make homegrown excess food, seedlings, plants and related items free and available to whomever needs them. It is a communal place that people can place their excess knowing it will be appreciated by others.

Onkaparinga announces its first Reconciliation Action Plan

The City of Onkaparinga this week announced the launch of its first <u>Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP)</u>. The RAP is an important step in strengthening relationships between First Nations people and non-Indigenous people in the region, for the benefit of everyone.

The council worked closely with its <u>First Nations People Advisory Group (FNPAG)</u>, <u>Neporendi Aboriginal Forum Inc.</u>, Reconciliation SA and Reconciliation Australia to develop the plan.

The Reconciliation Action Plan (Reflect) 2022–24 aligns with Reconciliation Australia's National Framework, which has four stages of reconciliation: Reflect, Innovate, Stretch and Elevate.

In this initial Reflect RAP, the council will build mutual relationships, grow cultural understanding, and develop a clear vision for reconciliation in the region.

Under the plan the council will develop the foundations to increase and support First Peoples' employment in the council and diversify its supplier base so more services and products come from First Nations suppliers. It will also deliver cultural training and knowledge among council staff.

The RAP builds on council's previous work with Onkaparinga's First Peoples including connection with the Kaurna Yerta Aboriginal Corporation, partnerships with the Neporendi Aboriginal Forum Inc. and Joining Hands and Minds Taskforce, as well as hosting events to mark Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC Week. Developing the RAP is a key action of Onkaparinga's Community Capacity Strategic Plan 2021–24. The council will progress to an Innovate RAP in 2024 to go deeper into its reconciliation journey

Council extends climate commitments in new plan

- City of Onkaparinga's ambitious plan to tackle <u>climate change</u> over the next five years has been
 approved by Council, formalising 79 initiatives to tackle climate impacts and community resilience
 across the region.
- The <u>Climate Change Response Plan 2022–27</u> was adopted on 16 August. It provides clear strategic direction for council's role in helping the city mitigate and adapt to a changing climate.
- The five-year plan has five overarching goals, with actions attached to each:
 - Climate-smart neighbourhoods: 19 initiatives including urban heat and tree canopy mapping, and developing a water options analysis to improve where and how council irrigates public spaces
 - Climate-ready communities: six initiatives including building the network of Community Led Emergency Resilience Network (CLER) groups across Onkaparinga to increase the capacity for resilience, and delivering more than 50 Sustainable Onkaparinga workshops each year

- Climate-resilient natural areas: 14 initiatives including completing an Ecological Linkage Study to increase biodiversity linkages across Onkaparinga's landscapes, exploring place-based Indigenous-led action with the First Nations People Advisory Group, and developing a coastal adaptation plan that responds to council's 2021 Coastal Adaptation Study
- Low carbon transition: 23 initiatives including changing Onkaparinga's remaining arterial and major road street lights and decorative lights to LED, installing solar on key council buildings, purchasing electric vehicles when council fleet vehicles need replacing, and developing a policy position on providing or facilitating additional electric vehicle charging on council land
- Climate risk reduction: 17 initiatives including expanding council's fuel load reduction program in high bushfire risk areas with new technologies, and undertaking stormwater capacity and flood risk assessments in each of Onkaparinga's eight creek catchments.
- Many of the plan's initiatives have multiple community benefits. Increasing the use of solar power reduces both carbon emissions and energy costs. Planting 6000 trees a year will sequester carbon, cool hot streets, and bolster biodiversity.
- The Climate Change Response Plan follows Council's recent endorsement of a <u>Towards Zero</u>
 <u>Corporate Emissions Roadmap</u>, which sets a target of 80 per cent reduction in the organisation's
 corporate greenhouse gas emissions by 2030.

Further engagement on water assets following community feedback

City of Onkaparinga has committed to further due diligence and engagement on the future of its water assets to address matters raised by the community.

Council has been investigating both divestment and the retention of these assets. This could mean a sale or lease of assets, joint or part ownership, joint or part operation, or a combination of approaches as well as retaining the assets in council ownership.

Elected members were set to decide whether to proceed to the next stage of the divestment process at the 23 August Council meeting.

Instead, Council cited the submissions of more than 600 people during the community engagement process and a petition, demonstrating the community's desire for additional information to make a more informed decision on whether to divest.

Feedback provided during the June-July engagement included submissions from Friends of Willunga Basin, Willunga Recreation Ground Inc, Onkaparinga Food Security Collaborative, Blue Water Estate Committee, The Wild South, and Better Together Christies Downs (Clean Up Our Creek), as well as from a range of other groups and residents.

The submissions called for more information on the following:

- · assets' financial history
- · ownership options
- future impacts to customer pricing and rates
- · environmental impacts and water security
- demonstration that a fair and balanced review has been undertaken.

City of Onkaparinga Acting CEO Julia Grant said the question of whether to divest has long-term ramifications for residents across the city, so it's a decision that requires careful consideration.

"The community has raised valid points that they need more information. This was outlined in the community engagement report as well as the community deputations during the Council meeting," she said.

"The Council has listened to those voices, which means undertaking a further round of engagement addressing the specific concerns raised by the community.

"The aim of this process is to deliver the most efficient service outcome for customers while seeking an appropriate return for council and ratepayers, but we also need to address the lack of wastewater services in parts of our city.
