Are You Prepared for Summer

Getting bushfire ready

A hot and dry fire danger season (which started on Monday, 1 December) is expected for SA, so all South Australians are encouraged to know your risks, and plan and prepare for the worst.

The Country Fire Service's key message this summer is "**Bushfires don't wait – do your 5 Minute Bushfire Plan before it's too late**", **acknowledging that if you live, work or travel in bushfire risk areas, you need to prepare, plan and be ready.**

Many at-risk residents feel their bushfire danger is low and believe that making a decision on what to do/having a plan in place is not a high priority, which is something the CFS says really needs to change.

The CFS website's Bushfire Ready webpage is the perfect place to start, linking you with key information on how to prepare your property, packing your emergency kit, creating bushfire plans (including for when you're holidaying or travelling through bushfire areas), staying informed via multiple sources of information, and more – cfs.sa.gov.au/bushfireready

We also have our own Prepare, Respond, Recover webpage, which includes a range of resources such as detailed guides from the CFS and Australian Red Cross – onkaparingacity.com/disaster-ready

Another fantastic way to prepare for bushfire season is to connect with a local community-led disaster resilience (CDR) group, which bring residents together to better support each other and prepare their community for emergencies.

There are currently 6 established CDR groups in Onkaparinga – Clarendon, Cherry Gardens/Ironbank, Kangarilla, Seaford/Moana, Sturt Gorge (Coromandel Valley/Craigburn/Flagstaff Hill), and Willunga – all of which welcome new members. Head to our website for more info.

CDR groups are supported by a City of Onkaparinga community connections officer, with Australian Red Cross providing workshops for groups to map strengths and local knowledge to help them develop resilience plans.

Beat the heat

Heatwaves have caused more deaths in Australia than any other natural hazard, so it's also paramount not to be complacent when it comes to the effects of soaring summer temperatures.

The South Australian State Emergency Service and SA Health have a range of tips to care for ourselves and vulnerable family members, friends and neighbours during heatwaves, and to prepare.

Onkaparinga's libraries and community centres provide safe and welcoming spaces where you can shelter if you don't have air conditioning.

The SA Housing Authority can activate a Code Red due to heatwaves to reduce the harmful effects on rough sleepers. They do this by connecting people with support services; and providing additional services including extended operating hours for services, increased shelter options, additional food services, sunscreen, etc. We share this information on our Facebook page.

How the council prepares for bushfire season

We maintain more than 1,900 hectares of open space and 1,200 kilometres of rural roadside reserves on a rotational basis all year-round. It is currently the busiest time of year for grass cutting as our field staff tackle the peak growth season. Increased rain and warmer weather leads to abundant growth.

Our tractor slashing and mowing programs will remain extra busy with the preparation period as the green grass dries out, so staff appreciate your patience.

Delivering for the Community - Planning for the Future

If you have ever wondered about exactly what the council delivers, there is an easy way to find out! Check out our annual report. We released our 2024–25 Annual Report last month, showcasing a year of strong community outcomes, major project delivery, and improved financial sustainability.

The report reflects our commitment to delivering on the Community Vision 2034, shaped by more than 5,000 residents.

This past year we have seen the power of collective action. From planting thousands of trees to opening new community facilities, we've been focused on building a city that's connected, resilient and future focused.

Key highlights include:

- 3 major multi-million-dollar projects commenced – Hopgood Theatre redevelopment, Noarlunga Aquatic Centre upgrade and the Witton Bluff Base Trail (with the theatre and base trail now open to the public)
- Over 8,000 trees planted, and 36,878 tonnes of waste diverted from landfill
- 44,275 youth program attendances and 410,868 visits to council-run recreation centres
- \$22.3 million secured in competitive grants for infrastructure and services
- 44,275 youth program attendances
- 410,868 visits to our recreation and aquatic centres.

The council's financial position has strengthened significantly. We delivered our first operating surplus following 7 years of budget deficits.

Borrowings are lower than forecast, and we had one of the lowest rates increases in the state for 2025–26 in line with CPI. The review of our Long-Term Financial Plan under the current chamber sets us on a path to reduce debt while continuing to deliver essential services.

Contrary to recent public commentary, council debt is under control. An apparent drop in debt at the time of the 2022 election was due to \$30 million in advance funding from state and federal governments, which temporarily offset borrowings. As projects are delivered, debt levels naturally adjust.

The updated forecast for June 2026 shows a reduced debt position of \$112.4 million – \$23.5 million lower than originally projected.

A moderate level of debt can be beneficial for funding infrastructure and services, particularly in a growth council like such as Onkaparinga – as long as it's managed properly.

We are managing debt responsibly, investing in infrastructure for a growing city, and maintaining services without compromising financial sustainability. See the full annual report at onkaparingacity.com

Please note the following activation and site will not be going forward for 2025–26 but will return for 2026–27:

Pizzateca Beach (Aldinga Beach) – This activation will not proceed for the 2025–26 summer season. The operators have chosen to pause due to concerns about the algal bloom and the potential impact on trade. Setting up the pop-up requires significant time and financial investment, and they want to ensure conditions are favourable to support a successful season. They plan to return for the 2026–27 season.

Nashwauk Reserve, Moana – Kohko Greek Island Beach Bar was originally approved through the Expression of Interest process to activate this site for 2025–26. However, as Pizzateca Beach will not be operating at Aldinga this season, Kohko will instead activate the Aldinga site for 2025–26 and return to Moana for the 2026–27 season.

Noarlunga Aquatic Centre Upgrade

The Noarlunga Aquatic Centre is taking shape as one of the region's most exciting community upgrades, with major works progressing to deliver a more modern, sustainable and enjoyable space

for everyone. Demolition and equipment removal are complete, the roof replacement is well advanced, and new pool systems and acoustic features are being installed.

The project has also grown beyond its original scope to include major sustainability and amenity upgrades, thanks to a competitive tender and additional funding.

These improvements will make the centre more energy-efficient and comfortable, while reducing long-term running costs. Highlights include new electric pool heating systems, double-glazed windows, upgraded insulation, refurbished spa and sauna areas, improved Wi-Fi, a refreshed café and reception area, and new landscaping.

The expansion reflects the council's commitment to building a healthy and sustainable community. This upgrade is about creating a future-ready aquatic centre that supports healthy lifestyles, reduces emissions, and provides a space our community can be proud of.

We have taken the opportunity to go beyond the basics, investing in modern systems and design improvements that will make the centre more comfortable, energy-efficient and enjoyable for everyone.

We have also applied for state government funding for an exciting new outdoor splash pad to further enhance the centre's family appeal.

While these exciting additions mean the reopening is now expected at the beginning of summer 2026–27, the outcome will be a high-quality, welcoming facility that will serve the community for decades to come. Weed Management

We are currently hearing a of discussion in the community regarding weed management. Council carries out weed control on unmaintained residential verges along main roads, such as Goldsmith Drive, 4 times per year, including treatment during November and December through our city-wide weed management schedule.

The Honeypot Rd/Goldsmith Dr intersection has raised some media interest. This intersection is under council care and control was mowed on Tuesday 2 December. This Noarlunga Centre urban location is not zoned as a high bushfire risk area. It is also worth noting the verge on the Colonnades side of Goldsmith Drive is privately owned.

For all other local urban roads, we conduct weed treatment on unmaintained verges 3 times annually, including a scheduled November and December treatment.

While our roadside weed control program is designed to reduce and manage weed growth, we can not guarantee all verges will remain completely weed-free between scheduled treatments.

Environmental factors such as rainfall, soil conditions and seasonal growth patterns can contribute to the re-emergence of weeds between maintenance cycles. This season's late and heavier rainfall, for example, has created excess growth between visits.

We receive many requests for maintenance work, including weed removal on DIT roads, which aren't maintained by the council. You can help by checking the [list of non-council roads in our city](#) before submitting a request.

How we prepare for bushfire season?

Council also undertakes fuel load reduction activities on our rural roadsides and open space areas, and our mowing program is based on a risk-management approach. Staff prioritise mowing in areas that begin drying (curing) first, and then progressively move into locations that typically retain moisture and remain greener for longer, such as the hills face.

This means we closely monitor curing rates and adjust schedules accordingly. Where grasses remain green, mowing may be temporarily held back – even if the fire danger season has formally begun – to avoid unnecessary repeat cuts and to ensure resources are deployed efficiently.

If curing occurs faster than expected, our program is adjusted to focus on higher-risk locations.

The introduction of [our high-tech, remote-controlled mower](#) has improved our ability to manage fuel loads in steep, difficult or previously inaccessible areas, enhancing fire-prevention outcomes.

Further follow-up mowing is scheduled in areas where regrowth is evident because of the recent late-season rainfall, to ensure we maintain appropriate fuel-load reduction as conditions change.

As the largest council in SA, we maintain more than 1,900 hectares of open space and 1,200 kilometres of rural roadside reserves on a rotational basis all year-round.

Dumped trolleys, nuisance lighting and more



Amendments to the *Local Nuisance and Litter Control Act*, long advocated for by Council, passed parliament on the **29 October 2025**.

The Environment Protection Authority (EPA) has provided the following update:

- New requirements relating to shopping trolley identification and collection.
- More efficient processes for the assessment and exemption of local nuisance.
- Inclusion of an offence for an installer who installs an air conditioner or external light in a place where it causes local nuisance.
- A general duty on business owners to prevent or minimise litter, including from stormwater management systems.
- Improved cost recovery mechanisms for Local Government.
- Registration of nuisance abatement notices in relation to land.
- Differentiated expiation amounts for a body corporate and an individual.
- Improved delineation for the regulation of nuisance occurring on premises licensed under the Liquor Licensing Act.

The amendments will come into effect in two tranches with the provisions relating to shopping trolleys planned to commence in the **first half of 2027**.

We are seeking further information about the planned commencement and continue to advocate for timely implementation of laws to manage dumped shopping trolleys.

Onkaparinga Immunisation Team Named Finalist in Public Health Awards

The City of Onkaparinga's Immunisation Team has been named a finalist in the 2025 Excellence in Public Health Awards — in proud recognition of their outstanding increase to immunisation rates of students in the School Immunisation Program.

Operating one of South Australia's largest immunisation services, the team services Onkaparinga residents and neighbouring councils of Marion, Alexandrina, Victor Harbor, and Yankalilla.

Their award-nominated initiative focuses on boosting adolescent immunisation rates through tailored communication strategies across diverse school settings. Innovations include:

- Customised messaging via email, SMS, and school platforms
- A new online consent form approved for school use
- A tailored schedule that ensures every year level gets two opportunities to be vaccinated — by separating visits across Year 7 and Year 10, and using each of the three visits to deliver catchups for missed doses
- Screening for missed childhood vaccines in Years 7 and 10
- Support for parents to update records in the Australian Immunisation Register
- Follow-up reminders via our online booking system
- Specialised Catch up clinics specifically for missed school vaccines run at the end of the year, during school holidays, and at times and locations convenient for students and parents

A large part of the strategy is tailored text message and email nudges after the school program has finished to achieve full immunisation by the age of 20.


