Storm Damage Update

Last week's high tides, strong winds and large surf impacted some of our popular destinations and infrastructure, some of which remain closed for repairs. The Port Noarlunga jetty remains closed after sustained damage to the decking and a section of handrail, and we're keen to see it re-paired and accessible to the community as soon as possible.

Inspections from external engineers began late last week. It's too early to say how long it will remain closed, but we're working with the state government and will keep the community up to date as soon as we know more.

We ask the community to stay safe and respect the closure – it is in place for your protection.

Port Noarlunga's Jubilee Park playground is also taking a soggy little break!

The severe storm turned the wooden fort at Port Noarlunga into a castle with its very own moat, so the playground will need to remain closed while we mop up, make things safe, and get it looking great again.

Flooding has damaged the soft fall surface, which now needs to be fully removed and replaced. The closure will also allow us to complete our other renewal works that were delayed by the storm.

We are aiming to reopen the play space by Friday 20 June, just in time for the July school holidays! We appreciate your understanding as we work to restore this much-loved community space.

A huge thank you to the SES, SAPOL and our council crews who worked tirelessly in challenging conditions during the storm and continue with the cleanup efforts.

2025-26 State Budget

The Local Government Association has provided the following details of the impact of the 2025 – 2026 State Budget on local government across the state and I feel it is important that our residents have this information. Treasurer Stephen Mullighan delivered his 2025-26 State Budget.

The below is a snapshot of some of the key initiatives relevant to local government. Over the coming weeks, we will engage with Ministers and departments to clarify funding allocations and continue advocating for the needs of our sector.

Office of Local Government

Targets over the coming year include finalising the 2022 review of council elections and introducing the long-awaited **Community Engagement Charter**.

The budget commits to the completion of the **State-Local Government Economic Partnership Accord**. We will maintain pressure on this to ensure they remain on track and deliver benefits to the sector. It was a direct ask by LGA to strengthen state-local coordination for major reform and investment.

Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass

The state government has committed \$131 million for Stage 1 of the **High Productivity Vehicle Network**, to deliver upgrades between the Swanport Bridge on the Princes Highway and Truro on the Sturt Highway.

This will partially complement the federal government's \$525 million commitment made ahead of the federal election in May 2025. However, it will result in an ongoing stalemate between the federal and state governments, as they have not yet settled on the preferred funding split for the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass.

LGA continues to support the state government's commitment to seek a more substantial funding injection from the Commonwealth given the agreed funding levels are to be reached as part of final negotiations between parties. We also note there is a precedent for seeking an 80/20 split with the ongoing Bruce Highway upgrade in Queensland.

With the previous defunding of the Truro Bypass through the Federal Infrastructure Investment Program Strategic Review in 2023, now is the time when the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass must be progressed to unlock heavy vehicle productivity across the state.

Separating out these important and strategic freight corridors will ensure we are well placed to create thriving places for connected communities to grow in the future.

Regional roads

Regional roads have been left out in the cold once again in this budget with a paltry investment of \$7.5 million over three years. This is especially disappointing when we know there is a maintenance backlog of over \$2 billion on our road network in SA, much of this connecting our communities in regional areas.

Whyalla Steelworks Package

The state and federal government will secure the long-term future of the Whyalla steelworks, with their previously announced \$2.4 billion package to stabilise the steelworks, support local jobs and encourage more investment into Australian made iron and steel.

Drought relief

The state government has previously announced a \$73.4 million to support drought affected farmers. This includes future drought preparedness and resilience programs, grants for infrastructure projects, fodder delivery support, upgrades to standpipes and business support.

We will continue to strongly advocate for more support, including a call for the government to offer a financing option to councils so they can defer rates for farmers and local businesses without this impacting cashflow or community services.

We also renew our call for reform of the Landscape Levy so councils are not financially penalised when supporting ratepayers through deferrals.

Planning reform

The budget supports continued investment in ePlanning and upgrades to the PlanSA platform, alongside planning system reform priorities.

Housing

Several measures on existing housing announcements:

- **Playford Alive East:** \$270.1 million over nine years to deliver the Playford Alive East project, providing more than 1,300 new allotments.
- **Onkaparinga Heights:** \$30.5 million over six years to deliver 2,000 residential homes in Onkaparinga Heights.
- **Southwark Master Plan:** \$104.7 million over six years to deliver the Southwark Master Plan, providing 1300 dwellings on the former West End Brewery site.
- **Housing Australia Future Fund:** \$135.1 million over three years to support a range of projects under Round 2 of the Federal Government's HAFF program.

LGA will continue to push for greater investment in enabling infrastructure, such as critical water futures, to enable liveable, well-serviced growth.

Domestic, Sexual and Family Violence

LGA welcomes \$3 million in funding over two years to coordinate the government's response to the Royal Commission into Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence.

We will continue to advocate strongly seeking fixed term funding for a minimum of 5 years for a dedicated domestic, family and sexual violence project officer based at LGA to assist councils support the state government response and implement the Our Watch local government toolkit.

Health

- **New Mount Barker Hospital:** \$45 million over three years to support the delivery of the new Mount Barker Hospital providing 102 beds and other essential services.
- **Bordertown Memorial Hospital:** \$8 million over three years to support aged care infrastructure upgrades at Charla Lodge Bordertown Memorial Hospital (jointly funded by the federal government).

Climate and environment

- **Adelaide Beach replenishment:** \$14 million for the continued replenishment of sand at West Beach and other Adelaide coastal areas and to implement the recommendations of the Adelaide Beach Management Review.
- **COP31 Planning:** \$8.3 million for early works to plan for the COP31 climate change conference, should Adelaide secure hosting rights.
- **River Murray:** \$109.7 million over four years to improve environmental flows and basin health of the River Murray.

Circular economy

LGA has previously advocated for tangible action to improve council **waste management** through legislative change, mandatory **product stewardship** options and expansion of the **container deposit scheme** in South Australia to include glass wine, spirit and cordial bottles.

A commitment to transitioning to circular economy principles is essential, to help keep kerbside services sustainable. This budget does not allocate adequate resources to action these important measures to create viable pathways for diversion and waste avoidance and minimisation.

City of Onkaparinga Corporate Emissions Annual Update



In 2022, council set a target to reduce corporate emissions by 80% by 2030, from a 2010/11 baseline. This target was extended in January 2023 with the [Climate Emergency Declaration](#), when the current chamber set a net-zero carbon emissions goal by 2040.

To achieve our emissions reduction ambitions, council approved a series of actions in the [Climate Change Response Plan](#) 2022-2027 and our [Towards Zero Corporate Emissions Roadmap](#) (TZCER).

Achieving the 80% emissions reduction by 2030 relies on a combination of actions outlined in the TZCER, including expanding solar and electrifying buildings through our Green Buildings Initiative (GBI), completing LED street lighting and transitioning our fleet to electric. While carbon offsets are

ultimately required to meet the 2040 net-zero target, our focus remains on reducing emissions as much as possible in the first instance.

Since 2010, our corporate emissions reduced by 54%, however, over the past two years, this has dropped slightly to 51%, due to a range of factors:

- **External factors** include state and federal net-zero commitments, evolving legislation, and changes to emissions reporting practices.
- **Internal factors** include timing of key emissions reduction projects, such as the Noarlunga Aquatic Centre upgrade and LED street lighting projects.

While fluctuations are expected, current project schedules and budget commitments indicate that we are unlikely to meet the 80% reduction target by 2030, however we are still working towards the aim of net zero carbon by 2040. A summary of current progress of the various elements that contribute towards this target are provided below.

TZCER targets	Progress
Electricity: <i>pursue options for 100% renewable energy for the sector from 2023</i>	We are currently exploring a long-term electricity contract, or Power Purchase Agreement (PPA), in collaboration with a group of councils to meet our future electricity needs. To claim the use of renewable electricity, additional Renewable Energy Certificates (RECs) must be purchased. At this stage, there are no plans to purchase additional RECs through the PPA. However, there is flexibility to revise this approach as we move closer to our 2030 target.
Buildings:	Since 2020, the Green Building Initiative has implemented 11 solar installations totalling 468kW on council buildings, five LED lighting upgrades and 8 EV charging stations using the Revolving Resources Fund. The Noarlunga Aquatic Centre is the main building upgrade scheduled for construction using this fund, prior to 2030.
Fleet and Plant: <i>80% electric cars by 2035</i>	On track to meet our target, transitioning 4 fleet vehicles to electric vehicles per annum, as well as plant. Currently 45% of fleet cars have been transitioned to electric or hybrid, as well as some other plant.
Streetlighting: <i>100% LED by 2025</i>	We have converted just over 50% of our 22,800 streetlights to LEDs using the SAPN tariff as a funding source. SAPN no longer fund the bulk LED upgrade of street lighting and council is required to fund the upfront capital cost. Business cases have been developed for the remaining lights, with payback periods of 3 to 10 years depending on the funding model chosen. We are currently not on track to meet this target.

The Procurement Policy and Procedure has been updated to include Net Zero considerations. Additional work is required to further integrate this into our current procurement practices.

The Environmental Sustainability, Community Assets, Projects and Operational Excellence teams are currently working on several critical initiatives to help continue to address our emissions reduction progress. These include:

- Preparation of an updated schedule of GBI projects, Revolving Resources Fund and emissions reduction projections considering budget constraints and project timelines.
- Reviewing our emissions reporting and operational boundaries to align with new LGA Net Zero Guidelines.
- Updating the emissions trajectory to reflect the updated project schedule, emissions targets, and any potential changes to the operational boundary.

These steps will ensure that we can refine our strategies and keep working toward our emissions reduction goals.

A report is scheduled to be presented to council in 2026, providing the outcomes of this work along with options for carbon offsetting and next steps (as outlined in the TZCER). Our emissions progress and work underway continues to be reported on annually via our website, climate change snapshot and annual accounting summary.

Patapinda Road Amenities Block, Old Noarlunga

As part of the playground upgrade adjacent to the Amenities Block on Patapinda Road, Old Noarlunga, we have commissioned artist Cat Dean to install a mural, reflecting the themes that local residents suggested in community engagement undertaken in 2024.

Councillor Jordan Pritchard, and Old Noarlunga Community Residents Association (ONCRA) representative Ian McClafferty, were part of the assessment panel in choosing Cat Dean to deliver the mural.

The mural will be on the long wall facing Patapinda Road and includes scenes from the sporting activities in the precinct and the river with birdlife. The Nankeen Night Heron in the foreground is considered the unofficial bird mascot of Old Noarlunga. A Pelican and a Corella also feature in the mural.

Callander Avenue Amenities Block, Old Reynella

As part of the playground upgrade adjacent to the Amenities Block on Callander Ave, Old Reynella, we have commissioned artist Taylr Jay to install a mural, reflecting the themes that local residents suggested in the community engagement undertaken in 2024.

Councillor Colt Stafford was part of the assessment panel in choosing Taylr Jay to deliver the mural.

The playground at Callander Avenue has equipment for small children and Taylr has created a mural that is playful and bright in a palette that will encourage children to be curious about the various pollinators, plants and animals, as well as the Coast to Vines Rail trail and a vineyard in the background.

Encore Summer Activation Program Continues to Grow



The Encore Summer Activation Program has successfully completed their third season, following the expansion of the program, which was endorsed by Council in 2022. Since its inception, Encore has consistently built on its success each year transforming our city into a vibrant and diverse destination.

The program enables business activations on vacant council land that deliver pop-up memorable experiences that showcases our coastline and tourism precincts for both residents and visitors.

The 2024-25 program delivered the following outcomes:

- Featured five standout activations
- Attracted over 29,000 visitors yielding an estimated economic impact of \$3.2 million
- Showcased 113 live performances
- Provided multiple seasonal jobs & stimulated supply chains
- Successfully relocated The SandBAR to a new temporary site (without any infrastructure)
- Reached an audience of 90,000 across various marketing channels.

Encore continues to grow and evolve, delivering significant economic and social benefits for our city and acting as a catalyst for local business growth.

Next Steps

The Economic Growth and Tourism team are now planning for the 2025-26 Encore Summer Activation Program including:

- Commencing the first right of renewal and permit process for returning summer activations including:
 - The SandBAR @ The Promenade, Christies Beach
 - TJS Twilight Markets @ Rotary Park, Christies Beach
 - Mamma's Beach Bar @ The Promenade, Port Noarlunga
 - Portal 58 @ Nashwauk Reserve, Moana
 - Pizzateca Beach @ End of Norman Road, Aldinga Beach
- Consulting community for activating the corner of Gulfview Road and The Esplanade, Christies Beach as an ongoing site, following the successful trial. If supported, it will be included in an Expression of Interest (EOI) process.
- Inform key stakeholders on EOI process to be undertaken for Wearing Street Precinct Port Noarlunga as a new activation site.
- Running an EOI process to invite proposals for activations at vacant sites:
 - O'Sullivan Beach Boat Ramp Area
 - Willunga Town Square
 - Port Noarlunga Beach
 - Wearing Street Precinct (new site)
 - Any existing sites where the first right of return is not taken up.

A request has been made to elected members to participate on the assessment panel and I have nominated to do so.

Support Your Local Library

It has been an eventful fortnight for our libraries, with Woodcroft Library experiencing some flooding last week following the severe storm. Thankfully, our staff worked extremely hard to get the service back up and running for the community within 24 hours.

There is a diverse range of events happening across Onkaparinga's 6 libraries over the coming month or two, including Pride Month craft workshops, an inspiring Refugee Week talk, an author talk from award-winning Western Australian author Holden Sheppard, and the annual [FirstFest](#) – a program of workshops, experiences and events aimed at complete beginners.

Libraries are the heart of our local communities, but adequate funding is critical.

For many people, the services and technology available through libraries are essential for learning, job hunting, creativity, exploring ideas, connecting with others and so much more. Libraries are not just about borrowing books – they offer a diverse range of services and programs that assist people of all ages, backgrounds and life situations.

The help available through libraries is essential for so many people – often those who are vulnerable or elderly. Library staff help people navigate the digital world and stay in touch with family and friends.

SA councils are asking the state government to flip the page on library funding and ensure public libraries receive adequate support by restoring annual indexation to state funding in the upcoming state budget. Without extra funding, local libraries will suffer a \$16 million shortfall in funding over 5 years – that's \$3 million every year not going into your community. South Australian councils invest around \$86 million each year in libraries and library service, recognising the enormous value they provide to our communities.

While the state government currently puts in \$20.7 million in annual funding for libraries, the amount lost when you consider CPI increases is a huge hit. The current funding shortfall puts library services at risk and reduces the ability of libraries to respond to emerging needs in their communities, as well as their ability to continue running existing programs and services.

City of Onkaparinga Supports Responsible Cafes



As part of our commitment to supporting the Community Vision 2034 goal - to transition towards a circular economy and support individuals and businesses to reduce waste to landfill, we are implementing a [Responsible Cafes](#) (waste and cost reduction) Project.

The project will run for four weeks in May/June and we already have seven spots claimed.

Responsible Cafes will work with up to 13 local food businesses (not just cafes) in our council area to support them to:

- Reduce their waste to landfill
- Implement increased reusables
- Generate extra revenue and cost savings
- Receive broker discounts and connect with businesses and suppliers who can provide alternative solutions.

During this time our local businesses will receive free personalised support, resources, and a sustainability audit and advice to implement practical and actionable strategies.

Businesses involved in the program will be showcased in case studies demonstrating changes that can be made and promoted to our wider community.

SA Councils Share \$1.45m In Coastline Protection Funding

Thirteen South Australian councils are set to share \$1.45 million in grant funding to help develop strategies to future-proof the state’s coastline from severe weather events like those seen earlier this week.

Funded through the LGA-led [SA Climate Ready Coasts program](#), the grants will bolster co-contributions from coastal councils to support local projects that progress planning for managing current and future coastal hazards, and a changing climate.

It comes as the state’s beaches were battered by heavy rain, strong winds and abnormally high tides on Monday, smashing against jetties, eroding sand and flooding nearby local businesses.

Projects receiving grant funding will assess coastlines and determine their vulnerability to storm damage, coastal flooding, erosion and sea level rise, and create hazard maps to prioritise future actions.

Information gathered through these projects will be shared between councils and can also be used to inform data-driven decision-making by state government and other coastal organisations.

LGA South Australia President, Mayor Heather Holmes-Ross said many councils are already finding innovative ways to combat coastal erosion and other impacts, and the grants would help fund further important work.

“Managing South Australia’s coastline is a joint local and state government responsibility; however councils are on the frontline when it comes to responding directly to the impacts of coastal hazards,” President Holmes-Ross said.

“Whether it be replenishing beaches with sand, replanting natural revegetation or maintaining and building infrastructure, such as seawalls, councils’ closeness to communities mean they play a critical role in implementing practical, on-the-ground solutions to protect lives, property and local ecosystems from rising tides and severe storms.

“Changing climate means these intense weather events are happening more regularly, and with limited resources councils and governments need to start thinking outside the box when it comes to planning for and mitigating coastal hazards.

“While these grants will help councils progress important planning work and support data collection, long-term investment is required to safeguard coastal communities and environments.

“It’s why LGA is calling on the newly re-elected federal government to create a national climate adaptation fund to help local government tackle climate challenges, including coastal hazards,” she said.

South Australian Deputy Premier and Minister for Climate, Environment and Water, Susan Close said it was vital to future-proof the state’s coastline against erosion and storm damage, and the State Government was pleased to partner with councils.

“More than 90% of South Australians live within 50 kilometres of our beautiful beaches, which attract more than six million tourists every year,” Deputy Premier Close said.

“Our stunning coastlines are one of our greatest assets and they are crucial for driving visitation and bolstering our economy but also connecting communities and supporting key industries.

“We need to act now if we want to safeguard our coastline for years to come and coastal hazard adaptation planning is an important step towards doing this.”

Among the projects being funded by the Coastal Hazard Adaptation Grants are:

- **City of Onkaparinga** is building on its award-winning Coastal Adaptation Strategy to deliver a real-time monitoring program using citizen science to track coastline changes and support adaptive management
- **District Councils of Elliston and Streaky Bay** on the west coast are collaborating to develop their first Coastal Hazard Adaptation Plan to understand climate risks and reduce future coastal management and infrastructure costs
- **Kingston District Council** in the South East will update its Coastal Adaptation Strategy using new hazard data and recent project outcomes to assist with ongoing management of the coastline
- **City of Port Lincoln** is progressing a Coastal Hazard Adaptation Plan to model the interaction of coastal hazards with stormwater and urban flooding – the first project of its kind in SA
- **District Council of Robe** will explore the potential for nature-based solutions, such as extensive re-vegetation, for key local beaches as an alternative to traditional engineering.

To further support the grants, new best-practice Coastal Hazard Adaptation Planning Guidelines have also been created in partnership with coastal practitioners, local and state government and can now be accessed by councils online.


Developed using similar frameworks from around Australia and overseas, they provide step-by-step guidance on how to prepare a Coastal Hazard Adaptation Plan in South Australia and can be adapted to suit different coastal contexts.

The SA Climate Ready Coasts program is being delivered by LGA South Australia in partnership with the Department for Environment and Water, Coast Protection Board, Adelaide Coastal Councils Network and SA Coastal Councils Alliance.

It is funded by the federal government's Coastal and Estuarine Risk Mitigation Program, the Coast Protection Board and the Local Government Research and Development Scheme.

Australian and New Zealand Council for fire and emergency services have released their seasonal bushfire outlook for Winter 2025 which shows an increased risk of fire for our patch of the country.

Noarlunga Aquatic Centre Update

Project tender process

We are pleased to confirm that, following an open tender process, Mossop Construction + Interiors has been awarded the contract for this project. Mossop brings extensive experience in aquatic centre developments, including the refurbishment of the Thebarton and Port Lincoln Aquatic Centres, as well as the recent construction of the Salisbury Aquatic Centre.

The works are expected to take approximately 12 months to complete.

Thriving Suburbs grant

We are also pleased to confirm that the agreement with the state government has now been signed, finalising the \$5.4 million funding contribution through the Australian Government's Thriving Suburbs Program.

Current scope of work

The current refurbishment works will include:

- Replacing the roof and ceiling
- New pool liner
- Installing a new solar system
- Updating the water filtration and disinfection plant
- Painting and cosmetic updates
- Separating the lagoon pool from the main pool
- Improving pool accessibility with a new ramp.

Additional scope and budget

As previously advised, additional pool upgrades are proposed as part of the draft 2025–2026 budget.

These include:

- safety improvements to the pool concourse
- sustainability measures to support Council's emissions reduction targets, including:
 - o electrifying the pool's air and water heating systems
 - o enhancing the thermal efficiency of the building shell.


Design of the additional upgrades is currently underway with the intention of delivering these additional works at the same time as the other planned building works. While the aim is to deliver the expanded scope within the same construction timeframe, we will keep you informed if there are any changes to this schedule.

In addition, we have also applied for a grant from the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing and are continuing to advocate for further funding to support additional upgrades at the Noarlunga Aquatic Centre.

Pool closure planning and communications

The centre – including the pool and gym – will close to the public from 8pm on 4 July 2025 to enable the construction works to commence. The pool is expected to remain closed for approximately 12 months, in line with the construction timeline.

We have been working closely with key user groups, including the Southern Performance Swimming Club and the Noarlunga Masters Swimmers, to support them in finding suitable alternative venues during the pool closure period.
